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
## Fathers

He faithfully guided his pregnant wife to Bethlehem where it was foretold the Messiah would be born. He then led his family away from the dangers of Bethlehem into Egypt. Today we venerate St. Joseph as the Diligent Protector of Christ, Head of the Holy Family, Mirror of Patience, and Glory of Homelife. He is also the patron saint of fathers, families, expectant mothers, travelers, workers, and the dying. Joseph's titles are proof that we can become holy right at home. But how? Just like St. Joseph, by loving and serving our

families united with God.

Even St. Joseph had few remarkable traits that, on the surface, set him above other men. But St. Joseph, and many other saintly fathers, model for us a father's duty to remain humble, teach the Faith, communicate God's love to their children, and, ultimately, lay down their lives for their families.

Each saintly father here challenges all fathers to embrace their vocation. May the fathers in our lives grow in virtue and love of Jesus, so that through their faithful witness, we can more fully experience God the Father's love for us.
